Tusla International Services

History of Service Development

1996

First Separated Child arrives in Ireland and one arrived in 1997.

2001

- 1085 Separated Children arrive in Ireland.
- Specialist social work teams set up within Health Boards one in Dublin and another in Cork.
- Separated children are accommodated in hostels.

2010

- Development (in 2009) and implementation of the "Equity of Care" principle
- Hostels closed, foster carers recruited, children's residential homes opened.
- Standard of care for Separated Children on par with Irish children in care.

2012

 A national service for Separated Children within the child protection services (Tusla) established.



- the Calais Special Project (CSP, now defunct)



Aftercare Statistics for Team for Separated Children

Age Breakdown



- Currently we have 91 aftercare cases allocated to aftercare workers.
- Drop-in Clinic (10-12 calls on average per month)

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under 16 0%16-18 20%18-21 70%
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over 21 5%

Specific Roles of an Aftercare Worker

- Assessment of Need/Aftercare Planning
- Support, guide and sign post in all aspect of the young adult's life
 - Education, health, immigration status, housing, welfare, counselling, family tracingetc
- Family reunification
- Advocacy

 Advice, guidance and support in the drop-in service

Challenges

- Eligibility criteria to access Aftercare
 - Age, length of time in care
- Length of asylum process/Parallel Care Planning
- Access to supports
- Family reunification
- Accommodation
- Outreach work around the country
- The ordinary vs. the extraordinary
- Vulnerability vs. Resilience
