- UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) – Article 8 *Awareness-Raising*
- NDA regularly commissions surveys to investigate public understanding and attitudes (2001, 2006, 2011, 2017)
- Positive trend in attitudes towards disabled people over time and decrease in perception that disabled people are treated fairly
- But some scepticism over the reliability of the results:
 - Are people responding positively just because they think they should?
 - Do people consider the implications of supporting costly policies?

Social Desirability in Survey Responses

• Survey respondents:

- May want to make themselves look good in terms of prevailing social or cultural norms
- May tell researchers what they think they want to hear
- So surveys may overestimate support for policies that help people with disabilities
 - Support dwindles when policies are to be enacted
 - Some subgroups may exhibit greater bias than others, leading to inaccurate inferences





- Large, nationally representative sample (N=2000)
- Recruited from panel held by a market research agency
- Materials informed by Disability Advisory Board
- Study completed online with multiple experimental stages





Stage 1 – List Experiment

- Welfare payments
- Housing
- Car parking

Stage 2 – Vignettes *Reported Separately*



Stage 3 – Policy TOs

- Cost of Living
- Child Support
- Infrastructure
- Employment

Stage 3: Inattention to Implications

- Survey Qs aim to be simple but people are "cognitive misers" / "rationally inattentive" (Sims, 2003; Taylor & Fiske, 1978)
- Where policies are costly to enact (e.g. increasing welfare supports), support may be stated in principle but not in practice



"The rule human being seems to follow is to engage the brain only when all else fails - and usually not even then" – Hull (2001)



<u>More should be done</u> to support disabled people in meeting the extra costs of living related to having a disability.

More of the Government's budget should be allocated...

A tax increase should be used...

Policy Support and Familiarity with Disability



ESRI Policy Support: Summary

- 1 in 7 estimated to withdraw support for increased disability welfare payments when afforded greater anonymity.
- Substantial decline in support for increased disability welfare when costs are made explicit, particularly for tax increases.
- Support for prioritising disabled people for social housing higher when provided more anonymity.
- 1 in 20 drivers admit to parking in a disabled spot without a permit.
- **Majority support most policies** and particularly robust among those closer to someone with a disability.





Thank you!

- Support for policies that favour disabled people is generally high in Ireland, but some people conceal negative attitudes
- Findings about familiarity suggest that inclusion in workplaces and communities and greater awareness on the challenges of disability may help
- Important to consider different types of disability in different social situations (Stage 2 paper)
- Experimental approaches useful for overcoming survey limitations
