THE ECONOMIC & SOCIAL RESEARCH INSTITUTE

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The Economic and Social Research Institute is a not-for-profit organisation which was founded in 1960 as the Economic Research Institute with the help of a grant from the Ford Foundation of New York. In 1966, following a report by a United Nations special advisor, the Institute assumed responsibility for social research and extended its title to The Economic and Social Research Institute.

The Institute is a private company, limited by guarantee, incorporated under the Companies Acts 1908-1990, and enjoys full academic independence. It is governed by a Council consisting of 30 members appointed from the general members of the Institute and representative of business, trade unions, government departments, state agencies, universities and other research institutes. A committee of the Council, the Executive Committee, carries out the functions of the Institute's Board of Directors.

The Institute receives an annual grant-in-aid from the Irish Government which, in 1992, covered approximately 45 per cent of total expenditure. The remainder of its income is generated from membership subscriptions, sales of publications, income from commissioned research projects and sponsorship of Institute activities by Irish business. The most important resource of the Institute is its high-quality staff with the requisite academic standards, training and expertise. The total number of full-time research staff at the Institute is 28. The results of the Institute's research have been included in over 400 published reports, in addition to the volumes of the Quarterly Economic Commentary and the Medium-Term Review of the Irish Economy, as well as in numerous books, articles in academic journals, etc., published elsewhere.

FOREWORD



Professor Kieran A. Kennedy Director

It is perhaps not widely known that less than half of the Institute's income now comes from the government grant-in-aid. This situation has advantages as well as disadvantages. The fact that the Institute itself has to raise directly more than half its total income ensures that the work of the Institute will be relevant to the users of its research - otherwise the Institute would not continue to secure such revenue. On the other hand, the needs of those financing research are not always synonymous with the general public interest. Accordingly, it is quite a challenge to maintain the independence of the Institute's research. Furthermore, there is a danger that research funding may not be available for some key areas, no matter how important they may be in the public interest.

Institute staff have responded magnificently to this challenging situation. They are determined at all costs to maintain the objectivity, independence and quality of the Institute's work. Regardless of the source of funding, therefore,

all issues are evaluated in the light of the general public interest, and the results published subject to standard ESRI refereeing procedures designed to safeguard the quality and objectivity of the research. In this the staff have the full support of the Council and Executive Committee. Many firms and organisations have indicated through concrete support that they recognise and value this approach as fundamental to the Institute's reputation. The sponsored research centres now in place at the Institute covering the areas of banking, energy, forestry, health, industry, the international economy, manpower forecasting and social welfare, all operate on this basis.

The Institute's involvement in Europe continues to grow. Among the notable projects undertaken during the past year were the organisation of an evaluation of industrial policy in Greece and Portugal; an assessment of the Community Support Framework 1989-93 and recommendations for the 1994-97 framework, at the request of the Department of Finance; and the European observatory for small and medium-sized enterprises, undertaken in conjunction with a network of institutes in the other eleven EC member states.

The publication by Oxford University Press early in 1993 of the book *The Development* of *Industrial Society in Ireland*, edited by J. H. Goldthorpe of Nuffield College Oxford and C. T. Whelan of the ESRI, is a major landmark in the development of the social side of the Institute. The book culminated from ties built up over two decades between Nuffield and the ESRI, and brings to the notice of an international audience the work of ESRI sociologists and applied economists in developing an understanding of contemporary Irish society that is both theoretically informed and policy relevant.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

INTRODUCTION

During 1992, 22 substantive reports were published either by the Institute or by outside organisations, in addition to papers presented at conferences and seminars, technical and working papers and journal articles. In addition, thirty-four commissioned reports were completed and fifteen surveys were undertaken for outside organisations. Major research was completed during the year in the areas of economic forecasting, industrial development, natural resources, rural development, energy policy, taxation issues, social welfare policy, evaluation of public programmes, manpower forecasting, unemployment, low pay, poverty, care of the elderly, pensions, information technology, psychological distress, health, education, wealth and financial flows. In the area of the international environment the developments within the European Community and their effects on Ireland were major themes. During the year the ESRI Industrial Policy Research Centre was launched and a very successful international workshop was held on the "Microeconometric Analysis of European Labour Markets".

Nineteen new research projects were commenced by staff of the Institute during 1992 in the following areas:

- (i) The European Community: programmes (e.g., Community Support Framework), policies and effects;
- (ii) Industrial Development: small and medium sized enterprises, industrial restructuring;
- (iii) Economic Growth: the two economies of Ireland;
- (iv) Energy and the Environment;
- (v) Population and the Labour Force: occupational employment and projections, the disabled and marginalised section of the community, long-term unemployment, graduate employment;
- (vi) Taxation and Social Welfare Issues;
- (vii) Poverty and Deprivation;
- (viii) Health Services: regional health status;
- (ix) Other Social issues.

At the end of 1992 over fifty major research projects were in progress at the Institute. Further details of publications and new projects are given in a companion volume to the Annual Report, entitled *Review of ESRI Research in 1992*.

ESRI RESEARCH

The range of economic and social research undertaken by the research staff of the Institute is directly policy oriented and relates to the practical problems facing the Irish economy and society. In the 1970s, particular importance was placed on education, taxation, housing, economic policy, industrial development, agriculture and fisheries and fiscal policy. Later, during the 1980s, research efforts were also directed towards public expenditure, unemployment, emigration, development of natural resources, Ireland's role in the European Community, trade, health services, social welfare, crime, etc. In the Ireland of the 1990's all these issues task the minds of policy-makers and legislators. For its part, the ESRI continues to provide a range of independent and objective research covering these major areas of economic and social activity. During 1992, the major themes of research undertaken by the research staff of the Institute can be summarised under five main headings, as follows:

The Irish Economy: Research in this area includes the on-going analysis of current trends in the economy provided in the Quarterly Economic Commentary (QEC), the longer-term perspective provided in the Medium-Term Review of the Irish Economy, published at two-year intervals; the programmes of research in progress in the various Research Centres established at the Institute since 1991, supported by outside organisations; and major individual research projects such as the "Ireland: North and South project, an evaluation of the Community Support Framework (CSF) (Ireland) 1989-93, the review of the Irish aquaculture sector and the study of the Irish economy in terms of the EC periphery regions. A major development in 1992, in the on-going analysis of the Irish economy was the inauguration of a formal procedure for monitoring developments in the world economy which ensures that the QEC keeps abreast of developments in Ireland's major trading partners. The programmes of research in progress at the ESRI Research Centres include:

- (i) Energy Policy: the effects of carbon taxes; GDP elasticity of energy; energy conservation; and the development of an energy data base.
- (ii) Industrial Development Policy: Ireland's competitive advantage; the wider impact of industry; and, associated with the work of the Centre, the operation and development of small and medium sized industry in the European Community.
- (iii) Forestry Research: impact of forestry on rural communities; land mobility and land use changes; land prices in Ireland.
- (iv) Banking and Financial Services: intersectoral financial flows; financial assets of households in Ireland; and inter-relationships of international flows of funds and interest rate differentials.

The major individual projects completed or in progress at the Institute during 1992 emphasise the practice at the Institute, where possible, to investigate a research area in its entirety rather than concentrate on a narrow aspect of a problem. The study "Growth and Development in Two Regional Economies: Ireland, North and South" commenced in 1992, is particularly significant in this regard. The project is a three-year joint programme between the ESRI and the Northern Ireland Economic Research Centre (NIERC), supported by the International Fund for Ireland and private business. This is a significant development which brings together, in a joint venture, the two major centres of applied economic research in Ireland with a view to investigating, in depth, the two economies. The International Environment: The Community Support Framework (CSF), the Single European Market (1992), the Maastricht Treaty and the Delors II Package and the enunciated principles of economic and social cohesion and economic and monetary union as European ideals mean that a comprehensive European structure encompassing economic and social developments is in the process of being put in place. This process is changing European economic realities and its effects on the Irish economy and community are now a day-to-day phenomenon. To think European is now an automatic response of the research staff of the Institute. ESRI research staff enjoy a growing international reputation which, more and more, is being utilised by organisations such as the Commission of the European Communities, the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development and the World Bank. Ireland's role in the European Community is a central theme of research carried out at the Institute together with responses to EC developments and the investigation of economic and social issues affecting the Irish economy and society. During 1992, Institute research staff were engaged in the investigation of modelling methodologies and the development of macroeconomic models for evaluation purposes on behalf of the EC. Institute staff also participated in EC wide investigative work in regard to the 1989-93 Community Support Framework (CSF) and are co-ordinating a number of inter-country EC initiatives in preparation for the 1994-97 CSF involving Ireland, Portugal, Spain and Greece. A major input to the work of the Forward Studies Unit of the European Commission was also completed during the year. This exercise involved focussing thinking beyond the 1992 programme, to the themes, issues and policies likely to be important in the years to 2010. The Institute is also a member of the European Network for Small and Medium Sized Enterprises (SME) Research (ENSR) which is engaged in a Community-wide SME three-year research programme for the EC. Staff of the Institute are also engaged in the EC Community Activities in the Field of Research and Technological Development (DOSES Programme) and are participating in two cross-country networks. In addition, staff were also engaged during the year in an evaluation of the CSF's contribution to Ireland's development and undertook evaluation of various EC structural funds intervention programmes in favour of human resources in Ireland.

Social Policy: In 1987, the Institute, supported by the Commission of the European Communities, the Department of Social Welfare and later by the Combat Poverty Agency, undertook a comprehensive survey of Irish households. In the region of 3,000 households comprising 8,000 adults were surveyed on a wide range of issues affecting households: income and expenditure, employment, family, health, welfare, education, housing and other public services, and financial aspects such as savings and assets. The data base provided by the survey is unique and has enabled the Institute to initiate soundly based investigations in areas such as poverty, employment, taxation, health, education, welfare benefits, public services, finance and wealth which are of immediate concern to policy-makers and research users in Ireland. In the region of twenty major research projects have utilised the data base compiled from the 1987 ESRI Household Survey. The results of the latest of these studies are reported in the Review of ESRI Research in 1992, which supplements this report, and include studies of low pay in Ireland and the wealth of Irish households, together with various commissioned reports for Government departments, State agencies and other organisations. In addition, the Institute has played a leading role in the area of poverty research carried out by the Commission of the European Communities. It was involved in the Community's initial action programme to combat poverty in 1986/87. In 1989, it undertook a further follow-up survey of the living and working conditions of a sub-sample of the households interviewed

in 1987. Since 1991, the Institute has been engaged in the establishment of a methodology of deprivation indicators of poverty and has completed a study for the European Commission in which the Institute acted as co-ordinator for the Community-wide project. Institute staff have also been actively involved in the European Science Foundation Network on Household Panel Surveys, in the EC Working Group on Guaranteed Minimum Resources and in the EC Poverty 3 Research Programme whose objective is to foster economic and social integration of the least privileged groups in society. The ESRI has been selected as the Irish partner in the proposed European Community Household Panel and is currently engaged in pilot work for this survey. It is hoped that this initiative will provide a rich and internationally comparable database for research on all aspects of income, poverty, labour force participation, employment and unemployment. The EC plans to launch the first wave of the survey in early 1994. Another aspect of ESRI participation in EC activities in the social policy area relates to the Human Capital Mobility Programme. ESRI applications under the Programme had a higher than average success rate and the Institute is currently involved in five projects in the areas of longitudinal household panel studies, European social policy, women's participation in the labour force, micro-simulation modelling (social policy and taxation) and fiscal implications of European integration.

In addition, major projects in the areas of care of the elderly, children in care and values and attitudes are in progress.

The Public Sector: Work in this area during 1992 consisted of research in the health services area in progress in the Health Policy Research Centre at the Institute, supported by the Department of Health, and the programme of research on social welfare issues supported by the Department of Social Welfare. Work in progress in these areas include:

(i) Health Policy Research Centre: evaluation of alternative Diagnostic Related Groups (DRG) Classification Systems, development of economic cost and audit systems for hospitals, case mix variations in ambulatory surgery, care of the elderly, a health status pilot project and a number of project evaluations in the areas of better health and human resources. Areas under consideration include smoking related research and the general medical services scheme.

In addition, the Hospital Inpatient Enquiry, which is operated by the Institute's Survey Unit on behalf of the Department of Health, is concerned with the collection of activity data from the major acute hospitals in the country.

(ii) Social Welfare Issues: microsimulation modelling of social welfare policy options, and the dynamics of poverty.

In addition, an investigation of social and other Government expenditure is in progress at the Institute.

Demography and Labour: The major impetus for research in this area is the ESRI/FAS (The Training and Employment Authority) joint venture in manpower forecasting. The three-year programme of work (1990-93) set out to assess manpower forecasting methodologies, review trends in the occupational pattern of employment in Ireland, and to provide manpower projections for different occupational groups. Similar work has also been undertaken for the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD). In addition, during 1992 a number of evaluations of EC structural funds initiatives and training programmes were undertaken. A major study of low pay in Ireland was completed and an international workshop on microeconometric analysis of Europe's labour markets was held at the Institute.

THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL RESEARCH TRUST

In 1990, following the decline in the Government's grant-in-aid, the Council of the Institute established a Standing Committee on Funding under the Chairmanship of Dr T.F. O Cofaigh, President of the Institute. The work of the Committee was highly successful. Financial support in the region of £2.5m was committed by firms and organisations throughout the country over the period 1990-1995. The major portion of the financial support committed is in the form of sponsorship of programmes of research in areas of key importance to the Irish economy. In view of the scale and diverse nature of the funds deriving from the fund-raising campaign, it was decided that a Trust be incorporated. The purpose of the Trust would be to ensure that targeted monies be used for the purposes for which they were contributed and not diverted to other areas. In addition, the Board of Trustees would continue to monitor the situation with a view to raising additional funds with the primary aim of supporting economic and social research in Ireland. On 21 December 1992, The Economic and Social Research Trust was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee under the Companies Acts 1963 to 1990. Furthermore, on 21 January 1993 the Trust was exempted from tax by the Revenue Commissioners in accordance with Section 333 of the Income Tax Act 1967, and Section 22 of the Capital Gains Tax Act 1975.

COUNCIL CHANGES

During the year Mr J.J. McKay, Dr P. Ryan and Professor S. Sheehy retired from the Council of the Institute. Mr J. Moran and Professor I. Graham were elected to the Council.

FINAL ACCOUNTS

The Income and Expenditure Account, Balance Sheet and Auditors Report for the year ended 31 December 1992 are given in Appendix D. Total income for the year was £2,531,119 and the Government grant-in-aid, £1,149,160. Current expenditure for the year amounted to £2,544,268 including depreciation of £20,560. Expenditure for the year is shown less an amount of £8,220 which was charged to Economic and Social Studies in respect of salaries and wages for 1992. This charge has been waived and written off in the Balance Sheet.
